Context

Comedy from interwar France, from the popular French filmmaker René Clair. Two convicts try to make their escape from prison. One goes on to vast financial success as the head of his own company. The other awkwardly tries to readjust to civilian life. What follows is portrait of work and friendship in France on the eve of the Depression. The film is frequently acknowledged as the inspiration for Chaplin's "Modern Times." Plenty of clever dialog tricks, comic and sound effects. Incredible Bauhaus sets from legendary art director Lazare Meerson add to the satire.

The film was produced just as the Depression was spreading across Europe. But France was slow to be hit by the economic downturn. In early 1931 in France, when the film arrived in theaters, unemployment was just 5 to 7%. This would not last for long. Within a few years unemployment in France would reach 20%.
